

Executive Summary


Methodology

Citizens for a Safe & Secure Raleigh conducted a survey among 600 likely general election voters in the City of Raleigh between April 21-24, 2024. The accuracy of the sample of 600 likely general election voters is within +/- 4.0% at a 95% confidence interval.


Raleigh Police Force is Understaffed






Public Safety Is the Top Issue with Intensity











Direct Correlation Between Voter Attitudes and Public Safety


Generally speaking, would you say things in the City of Raleigh are going in the right direction or are they off on the wrong track?




Do you approve or disapprove of the job the Raleigh City Council is doing?




Police Favorability Not As High as Peers



Vast Majority Supports Increasing Funds & Pay for Police




Majority Support Increases for Police Pay Raise

70% agree that public safety and crime in Raleigh would get worse if we don't fully support the police.




Gun Violence Is Driving Fear & Anxiety

Most Important Reason for Safer & More Secure Raleigh: Raise family (33%), less anxiety (15%), thriving businesses/jobs (13%), stronger economy (8%), better for seniors (6%), personal freedoms (5%), revitalize downtown (5%), schools (3%), restaurants-entertainment-shopping (2%), and destination for visitors (1%).

Despite serving the 2nd biggest city in North Carolina, Raleigh police officers get nearly \$23,000 less in salary than Charlotte police and there are six cities with much smaller populations who give their police bigger salaries.	80/	91/	39/	68/
